## Question 1:

a) What is the output of the following code?

```
var1 = 3
var2 = 5
var3 = var1 * 2 + var2 * 3
var2 = var3 - 2 * var1
var1 = var3 + var2
print("Var1:", var1, "\nVar2:", var2, "\nVar3:", var3)
```

b) What is the output of the following code?

You can assume that the user always enters a positive integer value. The program will produce the following output when the user enters 10 for the radius:

There will always be a single space between the first and middle names and between the middle and last names. The program will then print the first letters of the first and middle names each followed by a full stop, along with the last name.

The output of the program when the user enters the name Alan Mathison Turing is shown below:

Please enter your name: Alan Mathison Turing
A. M. Turing

e) Complete the following program so that it displays a slice of the string "television". The slice will always start at the beginning of the string and end at a random index. The minimum length of the slice should be $\mathbf{1}$, while the maximum length of the slice should be 1 less than the length of the string. Two examples of output from the completed program are shown below:

The function returns the total number of boxes required (any leftovers always require an extra box). For example, executing the following program with the correctly completed function, gives the output:

1. 35 items, 16 per box: 3
2. 28 items, 5 per box: 6
3. 456 items, 12 per box: 38

def get_boxes(total_items, items_per_box):

        print("Four")
main()
```

b) Write the following boolean expressions. Assume that the variable, value, has been initialized.

Checks that value is between 10 and 30 (inclusive) or equal to 40

```
value >= 10 and value }<=30\mathrm{ or value == 40
```

Checks that value is less than 15 but not equal to 3

```

def main():
    show_output(62)
