## 1 Introduction

Sine is a trigonometric function of an angle. For an angle $\theta$, the sine of that angle can be expressed as:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sin (\theta)=\frac{\text { opposite }}{\text { hypotenuse }} \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

A graph of the sine function can be seen below:


### 1.1 Taylor Series

It is possible to express the sine function using the Taylor series:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sin x=\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^{n}}{(2 n+1)!} x^{2 n+1} \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

## 2 Usage

The sine function is commonly used to model periodic phenomena such as:

- sound and light waves
- average temperature variations during the year
